About the Congressional Voting Record

Members of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) have a long history of lobbying Congress and holding their legislators accountable for how they vote on AAUW priority issues.

The AAUW Action Fund Congressional Voting Record provides information about elected federal legislators through the votes they cast or bills they co-sponsor on critical issues. This voting record covers the 118th Congress and is distributed to every member of the current Congress. Scored legislation was selected based on AAUW's Public Policy Priorities, which were voted on and adopted by AAUW members in May 2023.

The AAUW Action Fund examined each lawmaker's record on votes and co-sponsorships related to AAUW's Public Policy Priorities. The voting record lists bill co-sponsorships and roll call votes officially recorded on the floor of the U.S. Senate or the U.S. House of Representatives.

The voting record is neither an endorsement nor a condemnation of any member of Congress.

How to Use the Voting Record

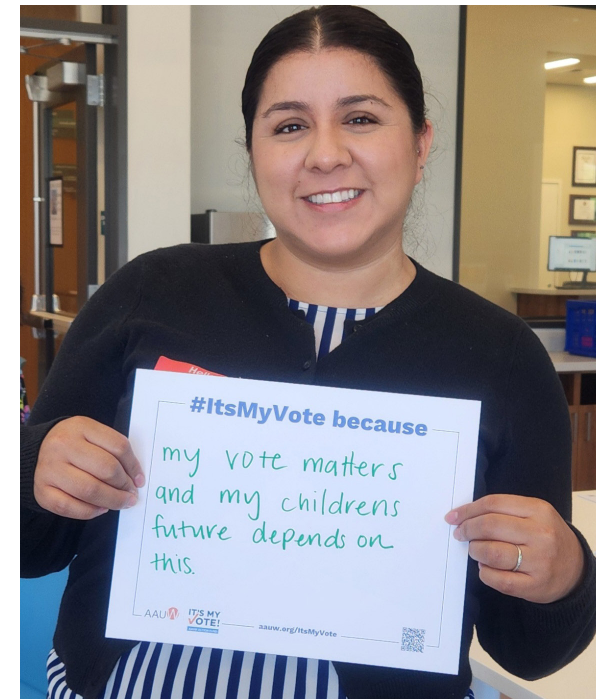
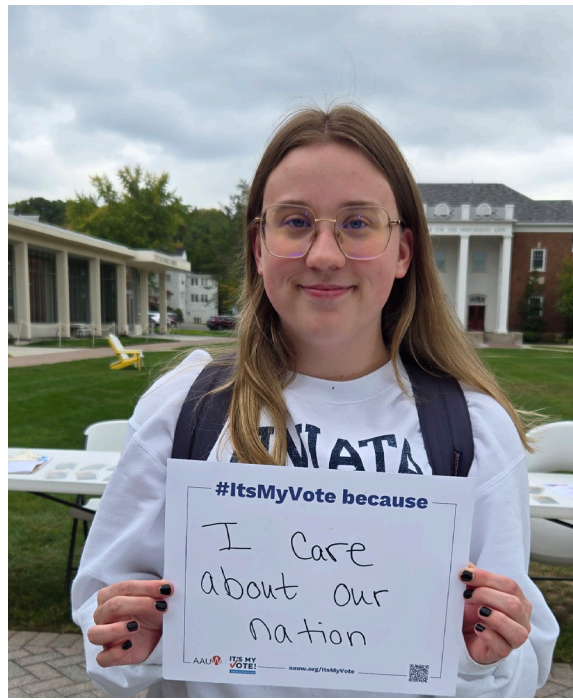
AAUW members and other concerned citizens can use the voting record to hold their senators and representatives accountable for their positions on AAUW's priority issues in a variety of ways. For example, you can refer to information in the voting record during community candidate and issue forums or at town hall meetings held by your members of Congress; use the voting record when writing letters to the editor regarding a legislator's position on AAUW's issues; and share the record with coalition partners, friends, family, and prospective AAUW members. By taking these actions, you help educate your community on the issues and on policy makers' records.

Reading the Voting Record

As a result of their votes and co-sponsorships, each legislator earns a percentage rating for their support of AAUW priorities. This rating does not indicate the full extent of a legislator's support of or opposition to AAUW positions.

A vote or co-sponsorship consistent with AAUW's position is designated by ✓. A vote or co-sponsorship inconsistent with AAUW's position is designated by ✗. **NV** indicates that no vote was cast. A **(blank)** indicates the legislator was not in office at the time of the vote.

Votes and co-sponsorships are given the same weight for scoring purposes in this voting record. A legislator's final score is calculated from the votes and co-sponsorships for which they were present.

ECONOMIC SECURITY

Paycheck Fairness Act (S. 728)

Sen. Patty Murray (D-Wash.) introduced the bill on March 9, 2023.

The Senate-introduced bill, which is a companion to the House-introduced bill of the same name, would take meaningful steps to update and strengthen the Equal Pay Act of 1963 that made it illegal to pay people different wages for equal work. PFA gets women and families one step closer to closing the pervasive gender pay gap by closing loopholes that have weakened the law over time to allow employers to justify paying workers unfairly. PFA creates more robust remedies for those who have suffered discrimination, prevents employers from retaliating against workers who discuss or disclose their wages, prohibits employers from requiring or relying on salary history to set wages, and provides much needed

training and technical assistance, as well as data collection and research.

AAUW endorsed the Paycheck Fairness Act. Eliminating the gender pay gap would drastically reduce the poverty rate for working women. AAUW's 2023-25 Public Policy Priorities advocate "Pay equity and fairness in compensation and benefits."

The measure had 51 co-sponsors: Democrats: 48; Republicans: 0; Independents: 3.

Family and Medical Insurance Leave (FAMILY) Act (S. 1714)

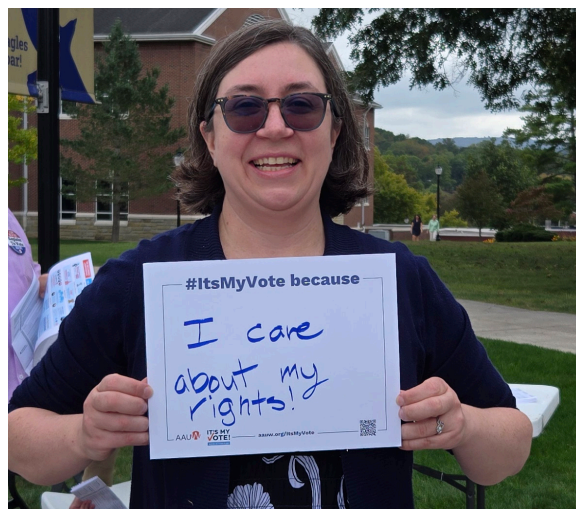
Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand (D-N.Y.) introduced the bill on May 18, 2023.

The Senate-introduced bill is a companion to the House-introduced bill of the same name. The FAMILY Act would create a national self-funding paid family and medical leave insurance program, funded responsibly by small payroll contributions from both employees and employers. The FAMILY Act grants workers with up to

12 weeks of partial income when they take time for their own serious health conditions, including pregnancy and childbirth recovery; the serious health condition of a family member; the birth or adoption of a child; to address the effects of domestic violence, sexual assault or stalking; and/or for military deployment leave. The FAMILY Act provides comprehensive coverage for workers at companies of all sizes and expands the definition of "family" to ensure a broad range of caregiving relationships are covered.

AAUW endorsed the FAMILY Act. Expanding access to paid leave means that workers won't have to choose between their own health needs, or those of their family, and their job. AAUW's 2023-25 Public Policy Priorities advocate "Greater availability of and access to a high standard of benefits and policies that promote work-life balance, including quality and affordable dependent care and paid family, medical, and sick leave."

The measure had 35 cosponsors: Democrats: 34; Republicans: 0; Independents: 1.



Healthy Families Act (S. 1664)

Sen. Bernie Sanders (D-Vt.) introduced the bill on May 17, 2023.

The Senate-introduced bill is a companion to the House-introduced bill of the same name. The Healthy Families Act would guarantee eligible employees the right to earn up to seven job-protected sick days a year to recover from their own illness or access preventative care; provide care for a sick child or family member; attend meetings related to a child or family member's health; or recover from or seek assistance related to an incident of domestic violence, stalking, or sexual assault. Healthy Families covers part-time and full-time workers at businesses with 15 or more employees, federal, state, and local

government employees, and a broad range of caregiving relationships.

AAUW endorsed the Healthy Families Act. Paid sick days keep working families healthy and economically secure by allowing workers to care for themselves and their families without risking their livelihoods. AAUW's 2023-25 Public Policy Priorities advocate "Greater availability of and access to a high standard of benefits and policies that promote work-life balance, including quality and affordable dependent care and paid family, medical, and sick leave."

The measure had 42 cosponsors: Democrats: 41; Republicans: 0; Independents: 1.

EDUCATION

Joint Resolution Providing for Congressional Disapproval of Student Debt Rule (H.J. Res. 45)

The U.S. Department of Education published a final rule on federal student financial aid programs (34 C.F.R. § 674, 682, 685) in October 2022. Rep. Bob Good (R-Va.) introduced a joint resolution to nullify the final

rule on federal student financial aid programs on March 27, 2023.

An identical resolution was introduced in the Senate. H.J. Res. 45 would reverse four months of the pause on federal student loan payments and interest accumulation, which the U.S. Department of Education ("the Department") originally initiated in March 2020, and require the Department to retroactively reinstate those balances to borrowers. The resolution would also require the Department to reinstate student loans for many borrowers who have received loan forgiveness for their public service.

AAUW opposed the joint resolution. AAUW's 2023-25 Public Policy Priorities advocate "Increased support for and access to affordable higher education for women, including alleviating the debt burden that disproportionately impacts borrowers of color and exacerbates the racial wealth gap."

Following passage in the U.S. House of Representatives, the Senate voted to pass H.J. Res. 45 (Roll Call Vote No. 135, 1st Session, 118th Congress) on June 1, 2023.

Democrats – 2 yes, 44 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 49 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting; Independents – 1 yes, 2 no, 0 not voting.

CIVIL RIGHTS

Joint Resolution Removing the Deadline for the Ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment (S.J. Res. 4)

Sen. Ben Cardin (D-Md.) introduced a joint resolution removing the deadline for the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment on January 24, 2023.

An identical joint resolution was introduced in the House. The Equal Rights Amendment would amend the U.S. Constitution to guarantee gender equality under the law and provide new opportunities for legal recourse for individuals who experience gender discrimination. Section 1 of the Equal Rights Amendment reads: "Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex."

The joint resolution would remove the arbitrary deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), included in the 1972 original proposal, and therefore recognize that the ERA has been ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states. This would allow Nevada, Illinois, and Virginia to count towards ratification, thus

passing the threshold to recognize the ERA as part of the U.S. Constitution.

AAUW endorsed the joint resolution.

Without the ERA in the Constitution, hard-won legislative and court victories against gender discrimination are at risk of being weakened or even reversed. AAUW's policy principles support publication of the ERA.

The U.S. Senate voted on the ERA for the first time in four decades. A cloture vote ends debate on a bill and allows the Senate to proceed to a vote on passage of the bill. A cloture vote on S.J. Res. 4 (Roll Call Vote No. 99, 1st Session, 118th Congress) failed on April 27, 2023. The Senate did not vote on passage of S.J. Res. 4.

Democrats – 46 yes, 1 no, 1 not voting; Republicans – 2 yes, 46 no, 1 not voting; Independents – 3 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting.

Women's Health Protection Act (S. 701)

Sen. Tammy Baldwin (D-Wisc.) introduced the bill on March 8, 2023.

The Senate-introduced bill is a companion to the House-introduced bill of the same name. The U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 ruling in *Roe v. Wade* found abortion to be a constitutionally protected,

fundamental right. However, the 2022 Supreme Court decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* overturned this long-held precedent. The WHPA would finally codify the right for patients to access, and health care professionals to provide, abortion care.

AAUW endorsed the Women's Health Protection Act. Abortion access is directly connected to economic security. People who are denied abortions have a higher rate of poverty and economic insecurity than those who can access them. AAUW's 2023-25 Public Policy Priorities advocate "self-determination of one's reproductive health decisions." This important right should not depend on where someone lives.

The measure had 49 co-sponsors: Democrats: 46; Republicans: 0; Independents: 3.

John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act (S. 4)

Sen. Richard Durbin (D-Ill.) introduced the bill on February 29, 2024.

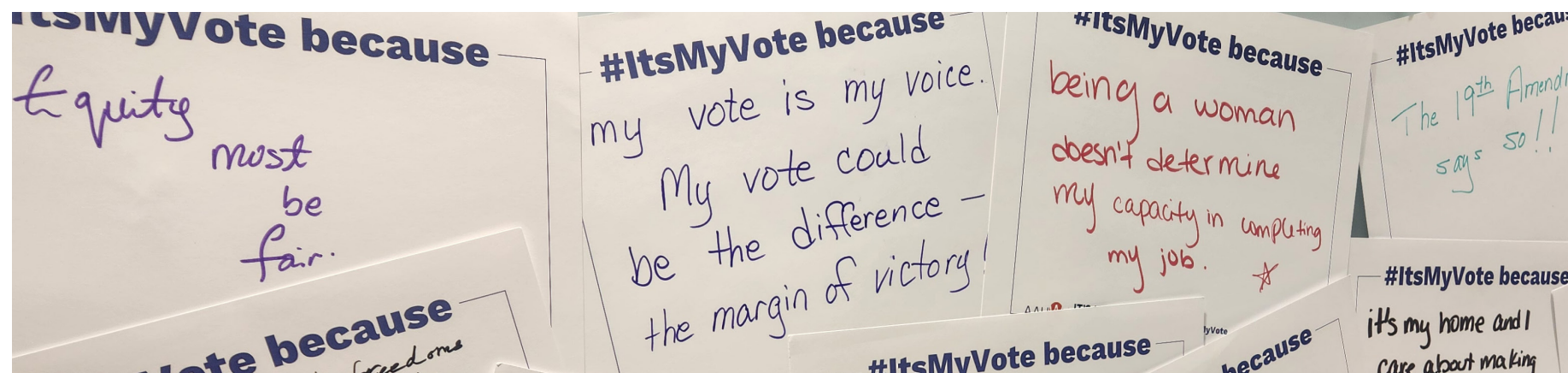
The Senate-introduced bill is a companion to the House-introduced bill of the same name. The bill would strengthen legal protections against discriminatory voting policies and provide a nationwide approach to protecting voters and includes new

tools to prevent voting discrimination. Some types of voting changes would be subject to prior approval ("preclearance") from the U.S. Department of Justice nationwide, if certain conditions are met, because those changes are so often discriminatory. The bill would increase transparency by requiring officials to publicly announce all voting changes at least 180 days before an election.

AAUW endorsed the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act.

AAUW's 2023-25 Public Policy Priorities advocate "Vigorous enforcement of and full access to civil and constitutional rights, including affirmative action and expanding voting rights."

The measure had 49 co-sponsors: Democrats: 46; Republicans: 0; Independents: 3.

pregnancy and childbirth recovery; the serious health condition of a family member; the birth or adoption of a child; to address the effects of domestic violence, sexual assault or stalking; and/or for military deployment leave. The FAMILY Act provides comprehensive coverage for workers at companies of all sizes and expands the definition of “family” to ensure a broad range of caregiving relationships are covered.

AAUW endorsed the FAMILY Act. Expanding access to paid leave means that workers won't have to choose between their own health needs, or those of their family, and their job. AAUW's 2023–25 Public Policy Priorities advocate “Greater availability of and access to a high standard of benefits and policies that promote work-life balance, including quality and affordable dependent care and paid family, medical, and sick leave.”

The measure had 154 co-sponsors: Democrats: 154; Republicans: 0; Independents: 0.

Healthy Families Act (H.R. 3409)

Rep. Rosa DeLauro (D-Conn.) introduced the bill on May 17, 2023.

The House-introduced bill is a companion to the Senate-introduced bill of the same name. The Healthy Families Act would guarantee eligible employees the right to earn up to seven job-protected sick days a year to recover from their own illness or access preventative care; provide care for a sick child or family member; attend meetings related to a child or family member's health; or recover from or seek assistance related to an incident of domestic violence, stalking, or sexual assault. Healthy Families covers part-time and full-time workers at businesses with 15 or more employees, federal, state, and local government employees, and a broad range of caregiving relationships.

AAUW endorsed the Healthy Families Act. Paid sick days keep working families healthy and economically secure by allowing workers to care for themselves and their families without risking their livelihoods. AAUW's 2023-25 Public Policy Priorities advocate "Greater availability of and access to a high standard of benefits and policies that promote work-life balance, including quality

and affordable dependent care and paid family, medical, and sick leave."

The measure had 117 co-sponsors: Democrats: 117; Republicans: 0; Independents: 0.

EDUCATION

Joint Resolution Providing for Congressional Disapproval of Title IX Rule (H.J. Res. 165)

The U.S. Department of Education published a final rule on Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (34 C.F.R. § 106) in April 2024. Rep. Mary Miller (R-Ill.) introduced a joint resolution to nullify the final rule on June 5, 2024.

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 is the federal law that prohibits sex discrimination in education. In 2020, the U.S. Department of Education rolled back Title IX protections. In April 2024, a new rule on how to enforce Title IX was issued that provides strong and comprehensive protections against gender-based discrimination in school for all students, particularly student survivors of sexual harassment, pregnant and parenting students, and LGBTQ+ students. The rule went into effect on August 1, 2024, though

its implementation has been blocked through litigation in 26 states.

AAUW opposed the joint resolution.

All students should be able to attend school without fear of harassment or discrimination. AAUW's 2023-25 Public Policy Priorities advocate "Strengthening and vigorous enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights laws pertaining to education."

The U.S. House of Representatives voted to pass H.J. Res. 165 (Roll Call Vote No. 354, 2nd Session, 118th Congress) on July 11, 2024.

Democrats – 0 yes, 205 no, 8 not voting; Republicans – 210 yes, 0 no, 10 not voting; Independents – 0 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting.

Joint Resolution Providing for Congressional Disapproval of Student Debt Rule (H.J. Res. 45)

The U.S. Department of Education published a final rule on federal student financial aid programs (34 C.F.R. § 674, 682, 685) in October 2022. Rep. Bob Good (R-Va.) introduced a joint resolution to nullify the final rule on March 27, 2023.

An identical resolution was introduced in the Senate. H.J. Res. 45 would

reverse four months of the pause on federal student loan payments and interest accumulation, which the U.S. Department of Education (“the Department”) originally initiated in March 2020, and require the Department to retroactively reinstate those balances to borrowers. The resolution would also require the Department to reinstate student loans for many borrowers who have received loan forgiveness for their public service.

AAUW opposed the joint resolution. AAUW’s 2023–25 Public Policy Priorities advocate “Increased support for and access to affordable higher education for women, including alleviating the debt burden that disproportionately impacts borrowers of color and exacerbates the racial wealth gap.”

The U.S. House of Representatives voted to pass H.J. Res. 45 (Roll Call Vote No. 234, 1st Session, 118th Congress) on May 24, 2023.

Democrats – 2 yes, 203 no, 8 not voting; Republicans – 216 yes, 0 no, 6 not voting; Independents – 0 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting.



CIVIL RIGHTS

Joint Resolution Removing the Deadline for the Ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment (H.J. Res. 25)

Rep. Ayanna Pressley (D-Mass.) introduced a joint resolution removing the deadline for the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment on January 31, 2023.

An identical joint resolution was introduced in the Senate. The Equal Rights Amendment would amend the U.S. Constitution to guarantee gender equality under the law and provide new opportunities for legal recourse for individuals who experience gender discrimination. Section 1 of the Equal Rights Amendment reads: “Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.”

The joint resolution would remove the arbitrary deadline for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) included in the 1972 original proposal, and therefore recognize that the ERA has been ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states. This would allow Nevada, Illinois, and Virginia to count towards ratification, thus

passing the threshold to recognize the ERA as part of the U.S. Constitution.

The resolution has not moved through the House Judiciary Committee. In July 2023, using a procedural rule, Rep. Ayanna Pressley (D-Mass.) filed a discharge petition (Discharge Petition No. 6) to force a vote on H.J. Res. 25 without a report from the committee by “discharging” the committee from further consideration of the resolution. As of September 27, 2024, the last day the House was in session before the Voting Record was published, Discharge Petition No. 6 had 214 signatures.

AAUW endorsed the joint resolution. Without the ERA in the Constitution, hard-won legislative and court victories against gender discrimination are at risk of being weakened or even reversed. AAUW’s policy principles support publication of the ERA.

The measure had 215 co-sponsors: Democrats: 213; Republicans: 2; Independents: 0.



Women’s Health Protection Act (H.R. 12)

Rep. Judy Chu (D-Calif.) introduced the bill on March 30, 2023.

The House-introduced bill is a companion to the Senate-introduced bill of the same name. The U.S. Supreme Court’s 1973 ruling in *Roe v. Wade* found abortion to be a constitutionally protected, fundamental right. However, the 2022 Supreme Court decision in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women’s Health Organization* overturned this long-held precedent. The WHPA would finally codify the right for patients to access, and health care professionals to provide, abortion care.

AAUW endorsed the Women’s Health Protection Act. Abortion access is directly connected to economic security. People who are denied abortions have a higher rate of poverty and economic insecurity than those who can access them. AAUW’s 2023–25 Public Policy Priorities advocate “self-determination of one’s reproductive health decisions.” This important right should not depend on where someone lives.

The measure had 215 co-sponsors: Democrats: 215; Republicans: 0; Independents: 0.

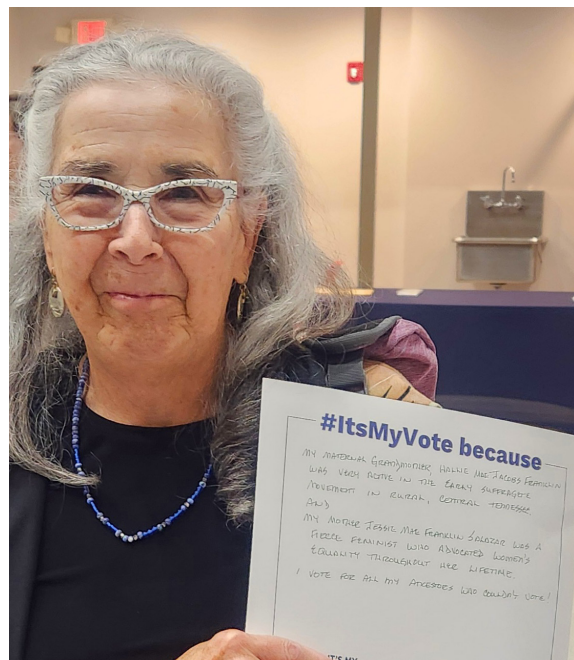
John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act (H.R. 14)

Rep. Terri Sewell (D-Ala.) introduced the bill on September 19, 2023.

The House-introduced bill is a companion to the Senate-introduced bill of the same name. The bill would strengthen legal protections against discriminatory voting policies and provide a nationwide approach to protecting voters and includes new tools to prevent voting discrimination. Some types of voting changes would be subject to prior approval (“preclearance”) from the U.S. Department of Justice nationwide, if certain conditions are met, because those changes are so often discriminatory. The bill would increase transparency by requiring officials to publicly announce all voting changes at least 180 days before an election.

AAUW endorsed the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act. AAUW’s 2023–25 Public Policy Priorities advocate “Vigorous enforcement of and full access to civil and constitutional rights, including affirmative action and expanding voting rights.”

The measure had 217 co-sponsors: Democrats: 217; Republicans: 0; Independents: 0.
